Cereal Box Book Report

Students will decorate a real cereal box with the illustrations and information related to one of the <u>Flat</u> <u>Stanley</u> by Jeff Brown books that you chose, using the directions below. I expect a lot of time, effort and hard work to be put into these reports. This is not an assignment that should be completed in one night. Directions should be followed, and a copy of the rubric that will be used to grade the book report has been attached.

FRONT OF THE BOX: Use a piece of white or light colored paper to cover the front of your cereal box. You will probably want to create the cover before gluing it to your box. Include the name of the cereal and a picture. Invent a name for the cereal that is related to the title of the book and sounds like a real cereal. Do not use the exact title of the book. Choose a shape for the cereal as well as colors and ingredients that all relate to the book. For example: for Dog Man Brawl of the Wild you can use a name like Puppy Crisps, a sweet cereal in the shape of dog bones or for Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone, you might invent a cereal called Wizard Wands, a toasted cereal in the shape of miniature lightning bolts.

RIGHT SIDE OF THE BOX: Make a list of ingredients that includes the story elements CHARACTERS and SETTING. Under the heading "Ingredients", list the main characters and write a sentence about each one. Then describe the setting. You can use the attached template or cover the side with white/light colored paper and do this your own way.

LEFT SIDE OF BOX: Write a summary that describes the book. Try to use words that will "grab" the reader's attention and make them want to buy your cereal. You can use the attached template or cover the side with whit/light colored paper and do this your own way. The summary must be three to five sentences.

BACK OF BOX: Design a game that is based on the book. It can be a puzzle, a word search, a word scramble, a maze, a crossword puzzle, a hidden pictures illustration, or any other fun activity that might be found on the back of a cereal box. Make sure it includes information from the book.

TOP OF BOX: Include the title, author, number of pages, and number of stars you would give this book if you were a book critic. Also, include your name. The maximum number of stars would be five. Use the template on the attached sheet.

PRIZE: Cereal boxes often include prizes. Your prize must be something related to the topic of the book. You can even include a picture on the front of your box to let the reader know what is inside the box.

Use complete sentences to tell where the story takes place. You may find that there is more than one setting in the story. For example, if you were using the story "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory," you might write:

The beginning of the story takes place in Charlie Bucket's very small house that he shares with his large family. Once Charlie finds the golden ticket and wins the contest, the rest of the story takes place in Willy Wonka's amazing chocolate factory.

The Flat Jesus Project

The incoming 2nd grade class will be completing the Flat Jesus Project that goes alongside their summer reading and book report on Flat Stanley. In the book Stanley is flattened by a falling bulletin board. Stanley soon finds that there are many advantages to being flat. One of the advantages is that now he can visit his friends by traveling in an envelope.

This summer you will be completing the Flat Jesus Project. This visible expression of faith reminds us that Jesus is with us wherever we go!

Students will make Flat Jesus (outline included) and will complete a journal (at least 10 entries) documenting Flat Jesus's adventures. In these journals students will include where they have taken Flat Jesus and what they have done. In addition to a journal, students will create a poster showcasing their adventures with Flat Jesus. Students will present their Flat Jesus adventures the first week of 2nd grade. Even if your family is not taking any trips please encourage your son/daughter to take Flat Jesus on every day trips. Pictures are HIGHLY encouraged and the students love to share them with the class.

In addition to Flat Jesus's adventures with your child, you and your child will select a friend or relative (preferably out of state) where you will mail your Flat Jesus, along with the attached letter and the journal for the host to record information about their city and state. Flat Jesus, the journal, and any other mementos are to be returned to the original sender. The journals written by a friend/relative DO NOT count toward the required 10 journal entries.

Please create a poster of Flat Jesus and his adventures. When displaying pictures, please include captions. Students will need to complete the journals and map of where Flat Jesus visited. Please make sure journal entries are in students' best penmanship and are written in complete sentences. A copy of the rubric that will be used to grade this assignment has been attached.
